Response: Hon. R. Tapaitau -I do not see what outburst the Member is talking about. I raised a Point of Order like any ordinary Point of Order that Members raise in this House.

2. Hon. G. Angene question to the Leader of the Opposition, Hon. T. Pupuke Browne – You, Honourable Leader of the Opposition in your speech yesterday mentioned about local Justices of the Peace becoming the Judge in our country. You are a lawyer amongst all these Justices of the Peace and this post better suits you. Are you willing to accept the Judge position in our country?

Response: Hon. T. Pupuke Browne — If I accept this position, I doubt whether the Prime Minister will give his consent. If the Prime Minister does appoint me as Judge, he will have no lawyer in court. Secondly, if I become Judge and there are many petitions from the CIP camp after a General Election, I will dismiss all of them (as a joke). Please Minister accept my answer, yes/no.

3. Hon. T. Pupuke Browne question to Prime Minister, Hon. M. Brown – I read an interesting article by Petero

Okotai on Tuesday claiming that we do not deserve our salary because we do not sit regularly. Mr Okotai recommended to pay us according to the number of days we sit. The idea attracted me maybe to control our sitting days. What are your thoughts Mr Prime Minister?

Response: Hon. M. Brown – That question should be directed to the Members of the Opposition because more than half of our team work in the Executive seven days a week. Our Members do more work outside of Parliament than in Parliament where we just sit, talk and debate. Members of the Opposition should question their Parliamentary salary as to whether it should be cut because they also work in a second job. I am not sure whether the Leader of the Opposition would support proposal. We are all in favour of enabling more sitting days and we spent more than a year going through our Standing Orders to find out how we can make that happen.

4. Mr V. Tupa question to the Leader of the Opposition, Hon. T. Pupuke-Browne – Can you Leader of the Opposition clarify your statement in the newspaper about your support to the use of marijuana for medicine and for a Referendum to be given to our people.

Response: Hon. T. Pupuke Browne – Yes, I did support the use of marijuana as medicine and a Referendum but I told CINEWS that was my personal view and not of the Democratic Party because I did not have discussions
